## TOWN OF PEMBROKE APPROVED ADVISORY COMMITTEE MINUTES 2 APRIL 2018

Linda Peterson, Chairperson opened the meeting of the Advisory Committee in Pembroke Town Hall at 6:30PM on 2 April 2018. Also present were Stephen Curley, Elizabeth Monks and Maria Karas.

James McCollum arrived at 6:51PM

Absent: John G. Brown and Jr. Stephen Walsh Guest: Larissa Curley, Chairperson Library Trustee

## PACTV recorded tonight's meeting

Linda opened the meeting welcoming Ed Thorne, Town Administrator; Michael Buckley, Town Accountant and Kathleen McCarthy, Town Treasurer/Collector to discuss the FY19 Budget, Annual Town Meeting and Special Town Meeting Warrant Articles.

- Linda asked about Article 4 in the STM Warrant submitted by the DPW Commissioners requesting to borrow \$105,000 to purchase one 550 Dump Truck, Plow and Sander, one New Dump Body and Hoist. She said if it can't go off road, why are we paying for it. Michael Buckley said the Water Department needs to dig trenches and wells and the plow would be used to plow the town.
- Article 1 of the STM to meet the shortfalls in the current budget Ed Thorne said he asked the Board
  of Assessors to release \$120,000 to fund this Article. They set funds aside from abatements; this
  funding is needed. Michael Buckley was asked about the Snow & Ice deficit. He said we are
  currently at a \$460,000 deficit. This does include recent storm related damages. Linda asked if this
  covers all three named storms.
- Article 2 STM Solid Waste Linda asked Ed about recycling. Ed said the town just passed 30% usage and hope to continue that progress. Pembroke started out paying four to ten dollars a ton for recyclables and it has increased to \$30.00 a ton. It costs \$56.00 a ton for trash. Maria asked what the goal was for recyclables; Ed said to go higher, close to 40%. Linda suggested to Ed that the Board of Selectmen send a message to residents to continue encouraging recycling.
- Article 7 in the ATM authorizing revolving accounts Linda asked about the excess of funds specifically Recreation Commission; they can only spend \$50,000 but they have \$200,000 in the account. Michael Buckley explained they have two sub-accounts. If there growing, the town is subsidizing. One is a 53D and there is no cap and the other is a 53E ½ which requires annual authorization for payroll. Recreation needs these two accounts to operate. Linda asked if that applies to any other revolving account. Michael said the Ambulance fund also has no annual authorization. He said this is documented in the Town Report.
- Ed said the Board of Selectmen is scheduled to vote on the STM and ATM Articles at their meeting tonight.

Linda thanked Ed, Michael and Kathleen for coming.

Linda noted that Advisory was asked to vote tonight on the Articles included in the Consent Agenda. These Articles include 1, 6, 9, 24 and 27.

And further to appropriate any remaining balance of funds as of the termination of the 2018 Annual Town Meeting from Community Preservation fund FY19 Annual Revenues to the Annual Budgeted Reserve. This was previously voted "Favorable Action" at Advisory's meeting on 3/12/18 but was listed Article 28.

**Article 27** –This Article does not require a vote from Advisory.

Linda welcomed Deborah Wall, Library Director.

- Deborah passed out the Library's Strategic Plan for FY19-FY23 along with the Pembroke Library's 2017 Report. She mentioned some of the highlights of 2017 such as adult computer use 8,768; 150 adult classes/events, 1,609 adults attended. Deborah was asked why so many used the Library computers. She said some do not have the software at home while others do not have access to a computer.
- In Article 15 of the ATM Deborah is requesting a vote to amend the by-law by upgrading the position of Generalist Reference Librarian to 37.5hpw. The position is currently 22hpw. She has \$4000 in her budget she would put toward the cost which would bring her request to \$24,016. Stephen Curley mentioned that we are in a difficult position due to the \$600,000 deficit and may not be able to vote favorable action. Maria asked about the step scale. Stephen Curley explained that it is common among municipalities. The Library staff is non-union and follows the Schedule C, Classification and Compensation By-Law. Deborah noted that the person in this position has passed Step 3. She said Pembroke has less staff than any other comparable libraries. She was asked if she could staff volunteers. She said probably but not likely. The major jobs at the library she is not able to staff with volunteers such as the circulation desk. Deborah noted there is software now available to convert circulation to self-check but it costs about \$60,000. She does not have funding for this and is not ready to request it. Her "book fine" line item is going down, currently at \$14,000; this was once as high as \$20,000. She also noted that Grants will not cover personnel. Stephen Curley noted that the town has signed the Community Compact at the insistence and good work of John Brown and there may be something that could be used for that. Deborah said that was

a good suggestion and would speak with Sabrina Chilcott, Assistant to the Town Administrator. Maria asked how many staff members she employs. Deborah said 7 full-time and 12 part-time. She has one custodian she shares with the Council on Aging who is leaving. The position has been posted.

## Linda thanked Deborah for coming

The committee reviewed and discussed the correspondence received.

- Town Manager Job Description Linda suggested inviting members of the Town Government Study Committee to meet with Advisory at the next meeting April 9, 2018 for further discussion.
- Advisory agreed to follow-up with Erin Obey, School Superintendent and Brian Van Riper to confirm appointments with Advisory scheduled for April 9, 2018.
- Meal Tax question Advisory received a response from Sabrina Chilcott, Assistant to the Town Administrator. Linda said Stop & Shop does charge meal tax on prepared foods. The question is does Cumberland Farms and 7-Eleven. The state collects this tax on Pembroke's behalf but are they doing this. Advisory agreed to ask Kathleen McCarthy, Town Treasurer and request a list of facilities collecting the meal tax.

Upon motion moved by James McCollum and 2<sup>nd</sup> by Stephen Curley the meeting minutes of March 26, 2018 was

Advisory adjourned their meeting at 7:30PM to join the Board of Selectmen meeting already in progress to hear the Town Government Study Committee presentation of their Town Manager Article.

Timothy Brennan presented the current organization structure of Pembroke and noted the success of aligning the municipal roles and responsibilities i.e. Inspectional Services, Board of Health services from the town meeting vote last year. He noted that some elected boards don't report to the Board of Selectmen and some volunteer board members manage staff. We are looking to have a structure in place when Ed Thorne, Town Administrator leaves. The population and services have increased. Tim reviewed the timeline as follows:

1998 Town Administrator by-law passed

2003 Town Treasurer/Collector changed from elected to appointed

2010 Town Manager Act at Annual Town Meeting failed

2014 DOR Report

2017 Municipal Inspectional Act

2018 Town Manager Act

Pembroke is outgrowing the structure. All professional staff should report to the Town Manager. Arthur Boyle asked when this information would be ready for residents to review. Town Counsel is reviewing the Article today. Ed noted that Town Counsel asked how this Article would be presented to residents. Would it be as a By-law, a By-law and question, a By-law and Special Act? Tim said their committee is scheduled to meet on Wednesday and will have an answer. Dan Trabucco said this Article moves the town forward with responsibility lines of reporting. The Town Manager will report to the Board of Selectmen and have a three year rolling contract.

Advisory adjourned from the Board of Selectmen meeting at 8:36PM back to their meeting.
