## TOWN OF PEMBROKE APPROVED ADVISORY COMMITTEE MINUTES 06 MAY 2019

Stephen Curley, Chairperson opened the meeting of the Advisory Committee in Pembroke Public Library at 7:00PM on 6 May 2019. Also present were Stephen Walsh, Kelly Seifert, and Maria Karas

Absent: Elizabeth Monks, Linda Peterson and Matthew Norton

**Guests:** Pembroke residents

This meeting is Advisory's 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual Financial Presentation to Pembroke Residents.

Stephen Curley said he will deliver a short presentation and then entertain questions.

- Revenue State Aid from 2009 at 33% to 2020 at 25%; taxes 64% in 2020 compared to 59% in 2009. State aid has increased 6.96%. Other available funds come from the meal tax and solar; increase of 560.89%. State aid is going down; steady decrease.
- Factors relative to surrounding towns, Pembroke's state revenue is 847 per capita; the average is 591 per capita. Brockton is 2082 per capita; state aid generally going to cities.
- Debt has increased from 2009 by 212.73%; we need to control. The Capital Plan is one tool being utilized to get under control.
- Benefits and Insurance increased 1.5% this year but the average is 6.5%/\$500,000 a year.
- Mandatory funds the big driver is Charter Schools.
- How we spend funds for Police and Fire; Pembroke is at the median. General Government is at 3%. Education is 52.8% of the budget. We are low on Public Works; this is being addressed. Our fixed cost is healthcare. The Total Expenditures of \$3,387.58 is in line with the median per capital spending.
- Snow & Ice expense is running 14-15% higher than most towns. We're back in line, \$5,000 square mile versus Hanson at \$8,000 per square mile.
- Stabilization Fund is \$1,386,348; trying to grow slowly.
- Unemployment is at 7.3% down 2.6%.
- Changes this year Town Building Maintenance custodian salaries and general expenses are now combined. DPW Pavement Maintenance line item is zeroed out; moved to Capital Budget.
- Stephen noting we are not using Free Cash to balance budget.

Stephen Curley opened up the meeting to questions.

Question- Why is lottery aid down?

Answer – The state formula changed about 10 years ago.

Question - What is the status of the Police overtime; doesn't he have a contractual obligation. Answer – Town Accountant is still concerned. Police Chief is still asking for \$150,000 more at Town Meeting. Advisory reviewed the FY19 YTD spend as of 3/31/19 and his budget was 74% through 75% of the year.

Question – Stabilization not growing

Answer – This is still a concern; Town Accountant wants to increase funding each year. Worker's Compensation Stabilization, trying to move to self-funding. OPEB Fund – also trying to fund each year. The pressure has been to cover payroll and prevent layoffs.

Question - Is it true that Hingham is at 0 for their Stabilization Fund. Answer – This information is provided from the Department of Revenue.

Question – Capital Budget – Any planning set aside for Police, Fire, Community Center buildings Answer – At this point – nothing has been set aside. It's estimated to cost \$30M for all buildings; trying to shift away from borrowing.

Question – Is there money in the budget for the clean-up of the Ponds. Answer – Yes – it's been ongoing.

Question – Infrastructure bill approved in Washington today – do you know how this will impact Pembroke. Answer – Not sure how it will impact Municipalities.
